- Access to Narcotics Anonymous (NA) support groups

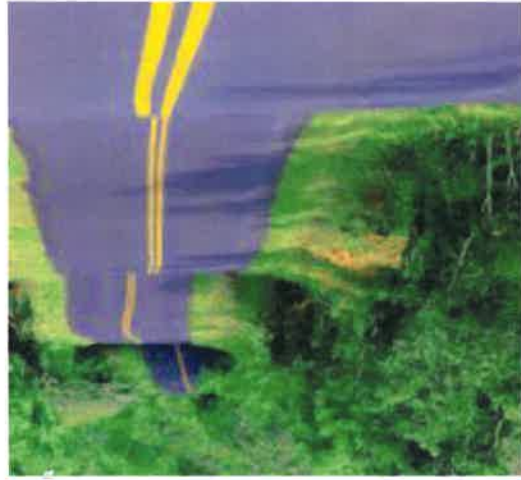
Statistics

- Of the 21.5 million Americans in 2014 with a substance use disorder over the age of 12:
 - 1.9 million abused prescription pain relievers
 - 586,000 individuals used heroin.
 - It is estimated that 23% of individuals who use heroin develop opioid addiction.
